From The Mayor's Desk

When I ran for Mayor, I promised always to be transparent with you no matter the situation. As I sit at my desk and write this month's from the "Mayor's Desk," I wish I could do it with good news. Still, the reality is that we are experiencing an upswing in the number of COVID 19 cases not only in Welaka but in Putnam County and across the State of Florida. Right here in Welaka, people you know have lost loved ones to this terrible dise se; my heart breaks for them, and I ask you to keep them in your thoughts and prayers. Still, others in our community have battled or are currently battling COVID-19, and they need your prayers as well. Please make no mistake about it. COVID-19 continues to be a real and present danger in our community and our nation, and I ask everyone to please do their part to help slow its spread.

First, if you are medically able to take the COVID-19 vaccine, I ask you to please consider doing so as it continues to be the single best way to slow the spread of COVID-19. The Putnam County Health Department offers all three vaccines free of charge to those 12 and up from Monday to Friday, 9:00 AM to 3:00 PM. Their address is 801 Kennedy St, Palatka, FL 32177. Putnam County offers drive-up COVID-19 testing located at 1101 Husson Ave, Palatka, FL 32177; it is free of charge times are Tuesday and Thursday from 9:00 AM to 2:00 PM. I encourage you to get there early as they are cutting off testing promptly at 2:00 PM.

At Welaka Town Hall, we have prepackaged masks in packs of five available to anyone who wants them. They are on a table in the hallway of Welaka Town Hall. They are free of charge, and I encourage you to stop by and grab a pack. Besides mask, I also encourage you to follow basic hygiene guidelines, including washing your hands frequently, avoiding touching your eyes, nose, or mouth, covering your mouth when you cough or sneeze. Tzy to avoid large crowds and poorly ventilated spaces when possible and stay home if you are sick or feeling sick. For cleaning and disinfection, clean high-touch surfaces daily. This includes tables, doorknobs, light switches, countertops, handles, desks, phones, keyboards, toilets, faucets, and sinks. These simple steps can go a long way in stopping this terrible disease.

On a more positive note, I have been looking at the steps necessary to update and modernize your town's government. One deficiency I identified early on was the lack of an organized codebook to reference Town Ordinances. I am pleased to say that your Welaka Town Council has approved me to move forward with a service called Municode to codify or arrange the Town ordinances into a Town of Welaka Municipal Code that can be easily referenced by Town residents and accessible online. This new codebook will not only give you better access to your city government it will also help us identify any deficiencies we have in our ordinances in specific areas. For example, upon taking office, I discovered that the Town did not have a clearly defined Parks Ordinance governing the use of our parks, something your Welaka Town Council is working to correct. With our new Munciple Code

Book, we will be able to clarify any areas in our Town Ordinances that need our attention and work qmckly to resolve them.

I also want to take the time to address the road situation in the Town of Welaka. Several residents have come to me to address the condition of our roads. Much of the issues with our unpaved roads with millings have to do with the heavy rain we get each afternoon. Unfortunately, going in at this moment to resurface these roads will lead to a waste of money from the millings simple washing out from the rain. Last week I had our General Maintenance Supervisor order a truckload of millings and lime rock. Our crew is currently going through the neighborhoods filling in any potholes and leveling the roads. I pan, with the Welaka Town Council's approval, of course, to go in later this year after the ram season and resurface the streets by breaking up the current millings adding fresh millings, and repacking them properly. We are also going to get bids from asphalt companies to repair the paved streets in Town. One of my reasons for forming the Citizens Advisory Task Force was to have them identify the roads they wanted to see paved and prioritize them to start getting them paved. Their plan will be critical in moving us forward in improving our streets. I ask you to please be patient with us as we work to improve our roads.

Finally, as I close out, I want to thank you for your trust in me to lead our community during such an uncertain time in our world. I take my responsibility very seriously. I promise to continue working alongside your Welaka Town Council and all our residents in Welaka as we work to move Welaka forward together.



The Founding of Putnam County

Putnam County was created in 1849. It was Florida's 28th county created from parts of St. Johns, Alachua, Orange, Duval, and Marion counties. The county was named for Benjamin A. Putnam, who was an officer in the First Seminole War, a lawyer, Florida legislator, and the first president of the Florida Historical Society. The Putnam County Historical Society has determined that Benjamin A. Putnam is the grandson of Israel Putnam, for whom other counties and places in the United States are named Benjamin A. Putnam died in the county seat of Palatka in 1869.
