# From The Mayor's Desk

Happy October, everyone! Fall is officially upon us, and I don't know about you, but I am glad we are finally seeing some cooler weather. These 100+ degree days have been terrible. With the cooler weather, we begin to welcome the holiday season. Our first event for the season will be our Spooky Golf Cart Parade and Candy Giveaway on Sunday, October 29th, at 4:00 PM. The parade will start at Downtown Park and will parade all over Town, ending at Jefferson Smith Park, where we ask you to park your carts and pass out candy to the children. So put on your best costume, decorate your cart, and join us for a spooky good time. Our second big event we look forward to this year is our 3rd annual Christmas by the River event. As always, it will start with our Christmas Parade at noon, followed by music, food trucks, and a craft festival in the Downtown Park. We will end the night with our annual Boat Parade on the St. Johns River. It will be on the 2nd Saturday in December, and we will share more with you in the November newsletter.

On the Town front, I have several big topics to discuss. The first is our budget. I am happy to announce that the Welaka Town Council has adopted our 2023-2024 budget. This year's budget includes the salary for a 4th Police Officer and some essential equipment for the Town. The largest being a new brush-hauling truck. Our current dump truck is over 40 years old and is in poor condition. It was worn out when the Town purchased it in 2005, and it's even worse now. When I became Mayor, the Town spent a fortune repairing worn-out equipment. We have now updated most of our equipment. We also have a maintenance program in place and our tracking equipment so we can move it out when it reaches the end of its useful life, instead of spending more to fix it than it's worth.

Another big topic I need to discuss with you is our Town Charter. I am excited to announce that after almost two years, the Welaka Charter Review Committee finished the draft of the new Town Charter. This has been a long, tedious project for the Charter Review Committee with over 30 meetings and over 235 hours going into the new Town Charter. Remember, our Charter is equal to our United States Constitution. It forms our local government, keeps your elected officials in check, and protects your rights as a citizen of Welaka. Our Charter was last updated in 1947 and was so outdated that parts were unconstitutional. Most of the Charter Review Committee's work was to make the updates to ensure it complied with Federal and State law. However, some updates that will benefit our Town residents include requiring six months' residency before you can run for Mayor or Town Council. Currently, someone who does not live here could run for office, and as long as they moved here after they were elected, they could do that. Our new Charter will require you to live in Welaka for six months before you can run for office.

A second significant area of improvement is moving the Town from the Mayor running the Town to a Town Manager overseeing day-to-day operations with oversight by the Town Council. As Mayor, I spent approximately forty to sixty hours a week managing the operations of the Town. My salary is \$800.00 per month, which requires me to have a second source of income. I am fortunate because I own several businesses; however, the Town cannot rely on the elected Mayor to oversee day-to-day operations. With the growth we expect in South Putnam County, we need a full-time, professional manager to ensure the Town is run responsibly. We witnessed with Hastings what happens when a Town is mismanaged. If the Town is not managed correctly, you could see your taxes skyrocket, public services reduced, and even the Town dissolved. Ultimately, your Town services, such as water and sewer, would be turned over to a third party not accountable to you, the residents of Welaka, and with no regard to what is best for our community. We have come too far to have something like this happen.

The third significant change involves your Police Department. Under the new Charter, the Welaka Town Council will only be able to dissolve or turn over the Police Department to an outside agency after first putting it on the ballot and having it approved by the residents. This is your Police Department, and you should be the one who gets to decide if it exists, not five elected officials. Two things to remember are: first, the Mayor position will remain, and you will elect that person; however, they will not have any administrative duties but will still have the same voting power as a Town Council Member. Along with the Council, they will give the Town Manager direction to oversee operations and monitor what they do. Secondly, on October

21st at 9:00 AM, the Charter Review Committee will begin to hold a series of workshops to review the Town Charter with the residents. I encourage you to please attend. In March of 2024, the new Charter will be placed on the ballot for a vote of the people, and I encourage you to be informed about the new, proposed Charter before you go to vote. So please mark your calendar and attend these critical meetings.

On a final topic, there has been some discussion about side-by-sides in Welaka. The Citizens Advisory Board has had multiple talks about their legality for months. My position is that the Town has issued stickers for side-by-sides for years, so personal responsibility has to be taken on the Town's part. On October 9th at 5:05 PM, there will be a workshop at Welaka Town Hall to discuss side-by-sides and their future in our Town. Please join us that evening and make your voice heard.

We have some crucial meetings happening in Welaka in October. As your Mayor, I encourage you to attend them and stay informed about your government. As always, it is a privilege to speak to you each month. I hope everyone has a great October, and I look forward to talking to you again next month.

# **From The Council President**

You may have heard the mention of CRAs at some of our recent Town Council Meetings. You may have also read my portion in last month's newsletter. Since we've been discussing this for quite some time, I wanted to take this opportunity to share more information with you regarding the process, formation, and ultimately desired results. This information comes directly from the Florida Redevelopment Association's website.

### What is Tax Increment Financing?

Tax increment financing is a unique tool available to cities and counties for redevelopment activities. It is used to leverage public funds to promote private sector activity in the targeted area. The dollar value of all real property in the Community Redevelopment Area is determined as of a fixed date, also known as the "frozen value." Taxing authorities, which contribute to the tax increment, continue to receive property tax revenues based on the frozen value. These frozen value revenues are available for general government purposes. However, any tax revenues from increases in real property value, referred to as "increment," are deposited into the Community Redevelopment Agency Trust Fund and dedicated to the redevelopment area.

It is important to note that property tax revenue collected by the School Board and any special district are not affected under the tax increment financing process. Further, unlike in some states, Florida taxing entities write a check to the CRA trust fund, after monies are received from the tax collector. In California, the increment is sent to the CRAs directly out of collected county tax revenues, before they are distributed to each taxing entity.

The tax increment revenues can be used immediately, saved for a particular project, or can be bonded to maximize the funds available. Any funds received from a tax increment financing area must be used for specific redevelopment purposes within the targeted area, and not for general government purposes.

### How does the CRA Process Work?

A public meeting begins the designation process. Several steps will have to be accomplished before the Community Redevelopment Area becomes a reality. These steps are briefly outlined below.

I. Adopt the Finding of Necessity. This will formally identify the blight conditions within the targeted area and establish the area boundary.

**II.** Develop and adopt the Community Redevelopment Plan. The plan addresses the unique needs of the targeted area and includes the overall goals for redevelopment in the area, as well as identifying specific projects.

**III.** Create a Redevelopment Trust Fund. Establishment of the Trust Fund enables the Community Redevelopment Agency to direct the increase in real property tax revenues back into the targeted area.

The Florida Legislature addressed CRAs in 2002 from an intergovernmental point of view, to strengthen the ability of cities and counties to manage CRA creation, notices and term issues. Disputes between cities and counties involving CRAs can be resolved locally by interlocal agreements, and should be, since they usually involve growth management issues other than just funding.

I hope this helps explain what a CRA is and how the process works.
