Several of us in Town think we suffer, but don't forget we do have businesses that are affected by these various orders. Income stops. Can you sit down for any meals, spend a little time over the bar or such things? We are absolutely in a State of War with the unknown. It is a terrible time. If we tried to make this more than just a situation of a lifetime and importance, let's try to become involved. So politically we are one body. It has put cramps on our style, but we are going to learn how to do it.

Public Meetings.

The last couple of weeks I haven't managed to attend Church service. We have watched messages at home. Last Monday after having watched Sunday service it came to my attention. How can we resolve the fact that we are still in business here in Town, and how do we connect things that we comply in both sunshine and other matters. Talking to the necessary agencies in Tallahassee, it was determined that yes, we can use it, that we can use such forms as churches are currently using. It will be outlined for you and posted in public places, as well as with the newspaper notices of how to exactly observe meetings during this period of time. No more than 10 can be in a meeting without being a violation. However, we will be able to transmit this so that you may watch it. It will be maintained as a public record and if so, desired you may obtain from us. If you wish to watch, make sure that you check with Town Hall at any time. Life must go on and doing it the way that we are advised to proceed. We cannot just stop totally all our efforts.



Cabin Fever.

Something of interest to do might be to read a book. Occasionally, those of us that are trying to avoid contamination or avoid the contagious disease that we're suffering need to think back. How did we satisfy ourselves? Certainly doesn't hurt to reach out. Use that phone a little while. Call that friend of yours that you would see every day. At least have a conversation with them. Try to keep upbeat, don't need to be snow bound to be having cabin fever restriction. Restriction to home suddenly makes you think deeply. We are a unique little Municipality and we do worry about each other. We are trying to work our way through these various current matters and still maintain this care.

How Much is a Roll of Toilet Paper?

How much is black market toilet paper? We have had to post at all our park restrooms that there is no toilet paper on hand. You should probably bring your own with you if you're going to feel the need to use these restrooms. As a result, we're just having to be tighter on our parks. During the month of March, the crew has spent between material and time over \$4,000 from repairing destruction in nearly every park. I realize children are home

from school. You've got to find something to do, but it certainly isn't the destruction of their Town. Supposedly a 16-year-old should be able to be left home, but who knows? Under stressful conditions, even children become stressed when confined. Let's tightened things up, and have respect.

Cemetery.

We attempt to make sure that you all know what we're doing and how we're progressing. The Cemetery has lost one of its major pine trees. It seems that we have lost so many over the last two years. You must maintain safety among our trees, but you still hate to lose that canopy.

Water and Sewer.

Again, we have had a few somewhat minor overages. We continue to ask that you let us know and we will show you how to do a little of your own homework in determining how much water you're using. We've worked with several over the last couple months. They have shown great interest in that and have a much fuller knowledge of what is necessary with the Utility System.



Fire Protection.

You will notice in the minutes that false accusations were brought about Sugar Mill Woods and their designated personal fire hydrant. The Fire Department and the County have all advised this is not a functioning hydrant. We have their words as well as our ISO ratings. We are in compliance and the only way that we can mark that hydrant is to mark it black, which means unusable for a person that rolls up with a firetruck. We just have to make sure that we stop some of this false information and twisted information as it circulates. We could move forward a lot faster. A lot of things take longer now, because we are having to combat false accusations misstatements. As we said before, find real happiness. If you really, truly can't find happiness here, maybe you should be moving down the road. It will come back and prices on real estate will probably increase again, who knows? <u>Mayor Sands Report</u>: (a) Destruction of Town Property-

Sands stated that our work crew spent hours maintaining/cleaning our parks, and this weekend we had destruction again. Pictures were presented to the Council of the destruction at 40 Acre Park (graffiti). Sands stated that we will have to start locking the parks to prevent this. Sands also stated that he will put in the Newsletter for a \$500 reward to anyone knowing who is responsible for the vandalism of our parks. (b) Care of Wetlands-Sands stated that he received an email for SJRWM regarding the removal of dead vegetation in the Village. The SJRWD can approve the removal of the dead vegetation and debris but will need a plan showing the areas and the methods to remove the material. (c) Sugar Mill Fire Hydrant - Sands stated that we have another matter to discuss. A video of Channel 12 News was played regarding a fire hydrant in Welaka. Sands stated that he asked Richard Bach, with the Welaka Volunteer Fire Department, to be present to speak on this behalf tonight. Bach stated that the fire hydrant at Sugar Mill was never meant to be used. It is on private property, and it does not pull enough water. It's never floated in a 350-gallon event. Bach stated that we have a 2,750-gallon tanker that responds, plus a 3,750-gallon tanker from Satsuma. Bach stated that in his opinion Sugar Mill is probably one of the safest complexes that we have. Bach stated that he has never had to go there for an active fire, with their hood systems, and canisters in the hoods, the property owner can extinguish any kitchen fires. Bach stated the hydrant is painted black, due to it not being intended on being used. Bach stated that he was a bit thrown off to hear of any issues because they have worked hard in the Town, the ISO rating went from 10 to 5, which they are diligently checking the hydrants making sure they are functioning properly. The ISO rating affects homeowner's insurance as well.

2019 Annual Drinking Water Quality Report for the Town of Welaka

We are pleased to present to you this year's Annual Water Quality Report. This report is designed to inform you about the quality water and services we deliver to you every day. Our constant goal is to provide you with a safe and dependable supply of drinking water. We want you to understand the efforts we make to continually improve the water treatment process and protect our water resources. We are committed to ensuring the quality of your water. Our water source is ground water from wells which are chlorinated and aerated for disinfection purposes and draw from the Floridan Aquifer.

In 2018, the Department of Environmental Protection performed a Source Water Assessment on our system and a search of the data sources indicated no potential sources of contamination near our wells. The assessment results are available on the FDEP SWAPP website at https://fldep.dep.state.fl.us/swapp/.

If you have any questions about this report or concerning your water utility, please contact the Town of Welaka at (386) 467-9800. We encourage our valued customers to be informed about their water utility. If you want to learn more, please attend any of our regularly scheduled meetings. They are held on the second Tuesday of each month at 6:30 pm at the Town Hall, located at 400 Fourth Avenue.

The Town of Welaka routinely monitors for contaminants in your drinking water according to Federal and State laws, rules, and regulations. Except where indicated otherwise, this report is based on the results of our monitoring for the period of January 1 to December 31, 2019. Data obtained before January 1, 2019 and presented in this report is from the most recent testing done in accordance with the laws, rules, and regulations.

In the table below, you may find unfamiliar terms and abbreviations. To help you better understand these terms we've provided the following definitions:

Action Level (AL): The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements that a water system must follow.

Maximum Contaminant Level or MCL: The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal or MCLG: The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

Maximum residual disinfectant level or MRDL: The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants. Maximum residual disinfectant level goal or MRDLG: The level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.

Parts per billion (ppb) or Micrograms per liter (μ g/l): one part by weight of analyte to 1 billion parts by weight of the water sample.

Parts per million (ppm) or Milligrams per liter (mg/l): one part by weight of analyte to 1 million parts by weight of the water sample.

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. The Town of Welaka is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but

cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. Information on lead in drinking water, testing methods, and steps you can take to minimize exposure is available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline or at http://www.epa.gov/safewater/lead.

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- (A) Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife.
- (B) Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming.
- (C) Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff, and residential uses.
- (D) Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are byproducts of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff, and septic systems.
- (E) Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

To ensure that tap water is safe to drink, the EPA prescribes regulations, which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which must provide the same protection for public health.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline at 1-800-426-4791.

In our continuing efforts to maintain a safe and dependable water supply, it may be necessary to make improvements in your water system. The costs of these improvements may be reflected in the rate structure. Rate adjustments may be necessary in order to address these improvements.

Thank you for allowing us to continue providing your family with clean, quality water this year. In order to maintain a safe and dependable water supply, we sometimes need to make improvements that will benefit all our customers. These improvements are sometimes reflected as rate structure adjustments.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers.
