

As of today there are 10,000 people in Putnam County on the wait list for a vaccine. This will happen in time, but it just goes to show where we are, and what has happened in the last year.

Additionally, with John's past nursery experience, he has been of great assistance to Councilwoman Milledge and the Tree Committee. John is on very good terms with many local nurseries, and as a result, for two years now we have been able to plant a large number of trees given to the town which would otherwise have been discarded.

Money anonymously showing up when we have needs, new refrigerators being bought, and encouragement. We had a wonderful Thanksgiving and Christmas thanks to the involvement of all these groups. Physical distributions under the safety guidelines places several of our people under serious cautions. We almost lost one of our primary workers to COVID. Not a senior, but a young person. Hospitalization, worrying about your young child, wondering if you are going to make it. It really takes a lot to feel so strongly about your neighbors. ## CLEAN-UPS

Clearing brush and delving into the depths of the Forty Acre Park and other municipal properties is a lot easier when the temperature is 50 degrees instead of 90. Hopefully you will notice the workforce has made much progress in reclaiming certain corners of the town. Rightof-ways have been cut back, and valve protection barricades have been installed. If you know of an area that you feel we should be looking at, let us know. We are trying to create a neat, enticing thoroughfare through town. No matter what happens, as Sam McGauley has stated before, it pays well to present to the public a wellmaintained town.

## **GRANTS**

Finally we have been able to issue a building permit to resolve the last client in our CDBG home improvement. This has to be one of the hardest grants that I have ever been involved with. We felt we had the need, and we proved we had the need, but the input needed by the clients just did not get accomplished. Title problems, property with no wills left, inability to secure title, it was just a shame we could not accomplish more. But closing out this grant would help us get back into cycle.

James King Trail paperwork is finally accomplished and we will be moving forward for some modifications at the Vacuum Station in Sportsman's Harbor. This is a \$50,000 grant which will enhance the area greatly. As we have told you in the past two months, we are moving along rapidly on a \$750,000 and a \$3.8 million application for enhancement to utility and several general area projects and betterment. All of these are remedying situations that will be accomplished by a grant or have to be financed from within. Prior to the recession, we had committed nearly \$5 million for a new sewer system. This fell apart during the recession of 2006. Seldom in a lifetime do you get another chance to recoup and move forward without reaching into everybody's pockets. The town has maintained the same millage rate for several years, and water and sewer rates have also remained the same.



## TIRES AND MOSQUITOES

Why the heck are we talking about mosquitoes in February? Well sometimes it takes six months to make sure you are prepared. In developed areas it's a proven fact that tires with water in them create one of the major causes of mosquito larvae developing. We do have to figure out some way to remove these tires from town. Those involved will undoubtedly have to pay some type of fee, but we hope that we can monitor it and resolve it before another mosquito season comes around. As an aside, my mother's first cousin was one of the major mosquito experts in the United States. During the Second World War, he was yanked out of the Harvard mosquito researched program, commissioned to Major, and assigned directly to General Patton in North Africa. Following the war, he spent the rest of his life researching Southeast U.S. mosquitoes. Just a little aside to show that I do know somebody.



#### GOLF CARTS

Folks, we have been with our tiedown, a little remiss on making sure that you are all licensed. Again, we bring to your attention that golf carts are not an entitlement but rather a privilege. Probably half of the town does not realize how we became a major golf cart area without a golf course. Make sure that the sticker on your cart is green, which is the only legal one. Make sure you have a driver's license. Side by sides make sure, don't mess up a good thing. We have allowed side by sides to become quite numerous. Capable of going much beyond 25 mph. Please show some caution and respect, don't mess up a really good thing. Enjoy it.

#### **INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT**

The Chief and I are finding to the point that Commissioner Pickens has been trying to accomplish updated interlocal agreements, especially when it comes to enclaves such as Beecher's Point, and Sportsman's Harbor. I cannot tell you exactly what the results will be, but the County Administrator and the County Attorney appear to be on board with us.

In regard to our Hardening Grants, Sands stated that we currently have an up-to-date engineering work on all three (3) grant applications. They are moving along. Sands stated that

We should be seeing some results done by a zoom-type situation for the inspection here this month. All grants total is nearly four (4) million dollars of applications. Let us not let it go to waste. Councilwoman Milledge Report: Welaka Village Report - Milledge stated that the Maintenance Department did an incredible job of cleaning up the pond off of Oakridge Drive. It is looking really nice. The pond off of 308 still could use a little bit of maintenance. Milledge stated that it was her understanding that we may be getting some more donations of trees probably in the spring. So, we are going to look forward to that if that actually happens. Milledge stated that the trees in Town that were planted are looking pretty. So,

you just got a whole new ecosystem going on over there that's kind of interesting to watch.

Councilwoman Finch Report: Update on Historical Meetings: Finch stated that normally we try to meet once a month because of everything that's been going on it's been less than that, but we did meet the requirements to be certified local government authorities. Basically, we submit paperwork on a yearly basis. Finch stated that we did have enough meetings this past year, and they're being more lenient because they understand the circumstances so we submitted that we should be good to go for this. Attorney Matters: Settlement of Rutkiewicz Petition (Case No: 20-183CA) - Patrick Kennedy stated that regarding our public records lawsuit, we believe that we have complied with a public record request as of December 9<sup>th</sup>. He stated that we were going to try to resolve this matter without using the courts if we can. Kennedy stated he asked Brian, our IT guy, to go deeper and see what he could do to recreate the records from the database from the computer. The Petitioners Counsel has provided the fees and cost to date of \$6,519.85 which represents a little more than 20 hours of Attorney's work at a rate of \$275 an hour. Kennedy stated that he is not asking you to accept settlement at \$6,600, but he is asking for settlement authority within the boundaries of their max. Kennedy stated that he does believe we have some offsets for the effort we had to put in and producing the documents. Watts made a motion to authorize Mayor Sands along with Town Attorney Patrick Kennedy to reach а settlement agreement up to \$6,600

for Case Number 20 – 183CA subject to Council being apprised of what is taking place prior to final approval of the settlement agreement on the amendment, second by Finch. Motion carried 5-0.
